How to Quote

Good Quotation Integration


The speaker in "The Raven" describes the setting of the poem: "it was in the bleak December;/ And each separate dying ember wrought its ghost upon the floor" (7-8). The speaker's use of the words "dying" and "ghost" add to the story's dark tone and Gothic elements, while also portraying his own obsession with death.

Step 1: Choose the Quotation

- The quote should directly relate to your thesis.
 - Subject AND Predicate!
- It should provide an example of the themes you are studying and the argument you are making about the text.
- It should NOT be used for plot summary.


Step 2: Introduce the Quotation

- Write a short sentence that previews what is happening in the quotation.
 - E.g. The speaker in "The Raven" describes the setting of the poem: "it was in the bleak December;/ And each separate dying ember wrought its ghost upon the floor" (7-8).
- Rewrite part of the quotation in your own words.
 - E.g. The speaker describes the setting as "bleak" and says that "each separate dying ember wrought its ghost upon the floor" in his home (7-8).
- If it is dialogue, state who said the words.
 - E.g. The speaker says, "'Tis some visitor entreating entrance at my chamber door" (16).



Finishing Off the Quotation

- DO NOT include any periods/commas inside the quotation marks.
- Close the quotation marks, then add a space, then insert the citation in parentheses.
- Finish the sentence with a period.
- The speaker in "The Raven" describes the setting of the poem: "it was in the bleak December;/ And each separate dying ember wrought its ghost upon the floor" (7-8).
